

GRAZINGS CENSUS

The Crofting Reform (Scotland) Act 2010 imposed new requirements on grazings committees to report every 5 years on the condition of their common grazings, the condition of every croft of tenant and owner-occupier crofters sharing in the grazings and on any other matter affecting the common grazings or crofting in any township associated with the grazings.

The Grazings Census provides the opportunity for crofting communities to tell the Crofting Commission about issues that are concerning them so that action can be taken where necessary. The Grazings Census will help build up a picture of what is happening on common grazings land, which can be used to provide evidence and information on the value of crofting and how crofting contributes to Scotland's economy. The Grazings Census also provides a valuable cross check for the Annual Crofting Census, which the Commission can use when working with particular crofting communities.

In-office grazings committees can ensure that they are complying with their Duty to Report by completing the Grazings Census form available on our website **www.crofting.scotland.gov.uk/common-grazings**. Hard copies of the form are also available, please call 01463 663439 to request a copy. Large print copies are available on request.

We have consulted with crofters and crofting stakeholders to make the form as easy and simple to complete as possible. The final part of the form allows grazings committees to highlight specific concerns they may have about misuse, neglect or non-residency of crofts in the township. It is in the interest of crofting as a whole that these issues are addressed to ensure that croft land continues to be worked for the benefit of generations of crofters to come.

The Commission is keen to work with grazings committees to ensure useful information is provided, particularly if you wish the Commission to investigate any issues further. The Commission will normally only investigate matters further where you consider that crofting duties are not complied with and you report this as a specific problem in Part 2 of the form. However, section 26B of the Crofters (Scotland) Act 1993 allows the Commission to investigate potential breaches of duty of its own accord.

2.2 Duty to Cultivate and Maintain or put to another Purposeful Use

The duty to cultivate and maintain your croft or put it to another purposeful use is applicable to both tenant and owner-occupier crofters. Cultivate includes keeping livestock, poultry or bees, growing fruit and vegetables, planting of trees, cropping and conservation activity. Maintain means that the croft must be kept in a fit state for cultivation which may involve drainage, control or eradicate vermin, bracken, whins, broom, rushes and harmful weeds.

A croft can also be put to another purposeful use such as a camping site, golf course or equestrian centre, but which will not prevent the croft from being used for cultivation in the future. Please note a tenant crofter may only put the croft to another purposeful use with the consent of the landlord or by consent from the Crofting Commission if the landlord has refused consent.
